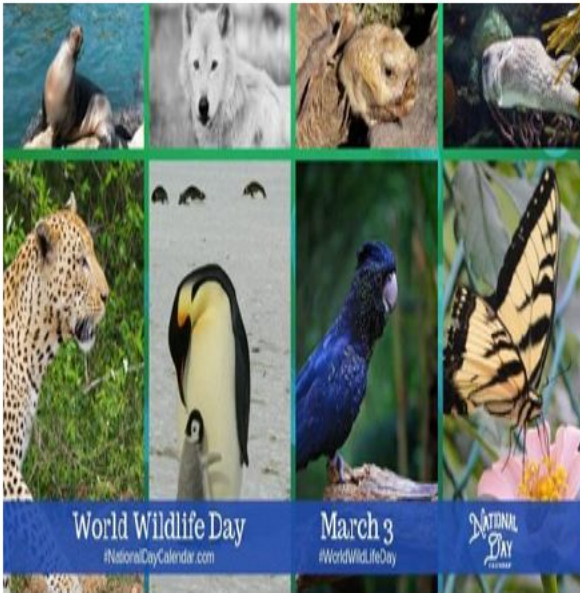

As a planet, we currently face the issue of overexploiting our marine species. Through global mass

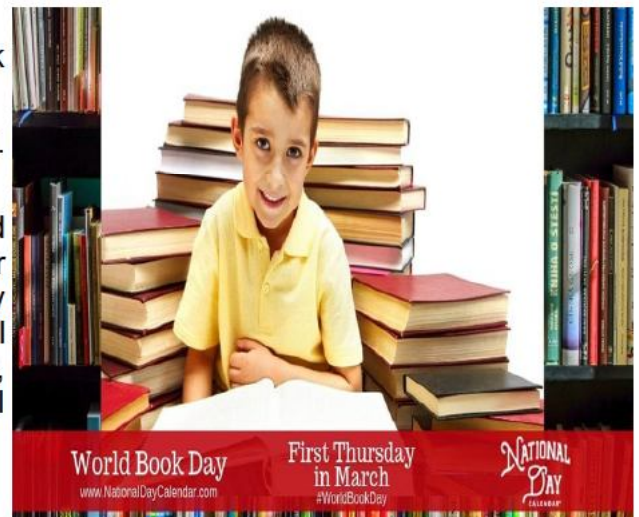
consumption, human impact has not only generated pollution and destroyed coastal habitats but causes irreversible damage.

A MESSENGER OF LOVE

This past May our world lost one of its highest regarded authors of our time. Dr. Maya Angelou will always be remembered for her inspiration, optimism, and courage. At an early age, Maya was abandoned by her parents and lived with her grandmother in Arkansas. An attack by a man when she was 7 caused her to stop speaking for much of her childhood. She became an intense observer and listener, immersing herself in literature and poetry. When the racial discrimination in Arkansas became dangerous, her grandmother moved her and her brother to San Francisco to live with their mother. There, at 14, Maya sought to be a conductor on the trolley cars but was denied the job because she was black. She sat every day in the office until they gave her the job. **Maya decided at an early age that *can't* was not going to be part of her vocabulary.**

Maya did not allow her challenging upbringing to define or defeat her. In high school, she pursued her passion for the arts, and by age 25 she was dancing, singing in operas, and acting in movies. **When times were hard, she focused on things she was grateful for and took responsibility for her choices.**

The US event was launched separately and was not linked to religion but was dedicated entirely to mothers.



Why is Mother's Day celebrated on different dates around the world?

In America, Mother's Day was established in 1914 - thanks to campaigns by the mums' groups which were established during the Civil War.

Anna Jarvis, the leader of this movement, campaigned for a May date in memory of her own mum - who had died that month.

President Wilson formalised the date, but Anna later became dissatisfied with the profit made around Mother's Day.

She believed the original sentiment of love and family had been sacrificed for profit.

She said: "A printed card means nothing except that you are too lazy to write to the woman who has done more for you than anyone in the world."

Many other countries have since adopted America's date.

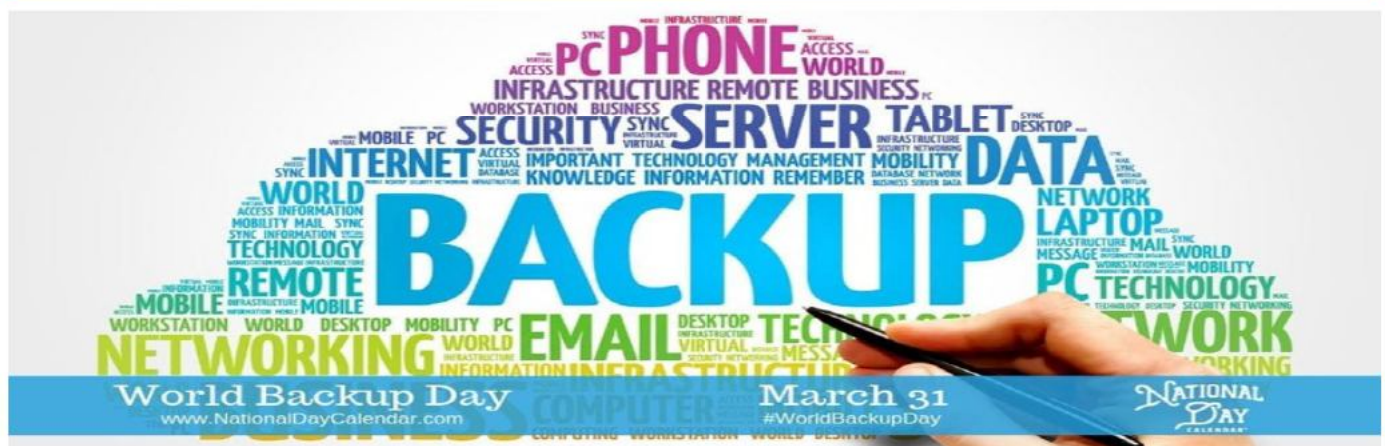




WORLD THEATRE DAY – MARCH 27

Forbes names Kylie Jenner the youngest 'self-made' billionaire at age 21

21-year-old Kylie Jenner was just named the youngest self-made billionaire.

Forbes announced Tuesday that Jenner had surpassed Facebook co-founder and CEO Mark Zuckerberg, who was 23 when he reached the billion dollar-mark.

"I didn't expect anything. I did not foresee the future," Jenner told Forbes. "But (the recognition) feels really good. That's a nice pat on the back."

Athlete Defends Herself

Caster Semenya is a female athlete from South Africa, and she has taken the International Association of Athletics Federation (IAAF) to court because it wants to force her to take medication to lower her testosterone.

The secretary for the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) said that the hearing will take one week which is unusually long.

People questioned Semenya's gender as a woman after she won the World Championship in 2009, and the IAAF wants to ensure that all female athletes have similar testosterone levels. The IAAF president said that the rules are there to help female athletes have fair competitions.



Serena Williams: a role model who stays true to herself

Winning endless tennis titles and constantly being in the spotlight will not stop Serena Williams of standing up what she believes in: Herself and women like her. Talk of Serena's greatness recently came in The New York Times in the article titled, "The

Meaning of Serena" by Claudia Rankine. Shedding light onto Serena's career was just the start of this; the author also praises Serena for staying true to who she is. Serena Williams, winner of 21 Grand Slam singles tennis titles, is proud of who she is, being an African American female to be exact. Check out this excerpt from "The Meaning of Serena": "Serena's grace comes because she won't be forced into stillness; she won't accept those racist projections onto her body without speaking back; she won't go gently into the white light of victory. Her excellence doesn't mask the struggle it takes to achieve each win. For black people, there is an unspoken script that demands the humble absorption of racist assaults, no matter the scale, because whites need to believe that it's no big deal. But Serena refuses to keep to that script. Somehow, along the way, she made a decision to be excellent while still being Serena."

Safer Facebook

Facebook is expanding its fight against political misinformation to help countries prevent foreign interference in their elections.

The company wants to prevent another scandal like the one in 2016, when Russian-linked operations used Facebook to interfere in the U.S. presidential election.

Facebook will require advertisers to be authorised before buying political ads, give people more information about the ads and start a searchable public library. The new tools will first launch in the EU before the parliamentary elections, then in India, Ukraine and Israel. They will become available globally before July.

The company also set up regional operations centres in Dublin and in Singapore which will add extra 'defence against fake news, hate speech and voter suppression'.

International Women's Day

On last Friday, March 8th, it was International Women's Day, and many people across the world took part in protests.

In Pakistan, people called for an end to violence against women, and in India, women called for action on domestic violence. In the Philippines, protests demanded President Duterte respect women's rights. In Istanbul, there were also protests.

In Russia, the military released group images of its soldiers with ballerinas to celebrate the day, although the pictures did not feature any of the country's 45,000 servicewomen.



Change in YouTube

YouTube is rewriting its algorithms so that fewer conspiracy theory videos will be recommended to users. The company says that its goal is to give users a better experience by reducing content that 'could misinform users in harmful ways'.

For example, this concerns videos which promote phoney miracle cures for serious illnesses, videos which claim that the earth is flat, or videos which make false claims about events like 9/11 (the attack on the World Trade Centre). One user on YouTube, Joshua Cox, said that YouTube's move was about censorship.

The move may be motivated by criticism which YouTube faced last year – a video suggested that David Hogg, a student who survived a school shooting, was an actor. The video was viewed over 200,000 times before YouTube removed it.

The change will affect less than 1 per cent of videos, but users around the world watch an average of 1 billion hours of YouTube videos a day.

Global Climate Strike: Students around the world protest climate inaction (March 15)

The Global Climate Strike: Students walked out of their classrooms in over 100 countries to protest climate inaction.

Here's why: They say their governments have failed future generations by not cutting emissions and curbing global warming.



In cities across India, school students joined climate strikes.

Vidit Baya, head of the Fridays for Future movement in India, tells CNN that India is already suffering from the impacts of

climate change. "In 2018, severe floods affected the coastal state of Kerala killing hundreds and injuring thousands. It is suspected that a 2 degrees Celsius rise in world's temperature will make India's monsoon ever more unpredictable," he says. "Rising sea levels will impact

agriculture and degrade groundwater quality," according to Baya.

Thousands of young people have gathered in Luxembourg City, singing, dancing and listening to speeches.

"We strike to express our dissatisfaction with current large-scale inaction on climate change," says Zelig Guisset, from Youth for Climate Luxembourg.

"To show we are gravely concerned about the world we will live our future lives in. To demand that treating the climate crisis as the crisis it is. Hoping that our strike will urge and pressure politicians or other people in power to take the urgent action needed to solve this climate crisis.

"Thirty years of 'small individual acts' and 'everyone does their bit' has not worked.

Meet the globetrotting cyclist collecting 1,001 climate change stories

Tuvalu

The highest point on this low-lying coral atoll nation in the Pacific is only four meters (12.5ft) above sea level. With a population just shy of 11,000, Tuvalu is one of the smallest and most remote countries on the planet.

I lived in Tuvalu for a month, from December 2014 to January 2015, and during that time I made friends with Losite, a Tuvaluan my age, who invited me to the outer island of Nukufetau to spend Christmas with her family.

Losite's mother, Nisikata, works as a primary school teacher in Nukufetau. We sat overlooking the sea. She told me the story of a drought that lasted from April to December 2013: "Our local taro crops [and] the fish died because of the drought," she said. "We usually get water from rain. And when we [went to] fetch water from our tank ... it's all empty."

"The underground well water [was] also salty," Nisikata said. "There used to be a freshwater lens under Tuvalu. In the last 15 years, due to sea level change, that freshwater lens has become salty and impossible to drink."

"With the drought, so many things that affected our life, like our livestock. We depend on pigs, [and were] also facing problem by finding food. Coconuts are not bearing fruit ... green nuts are all falling down. [It was] very hard to find anything to drink," she said.

"Donors from overseas gave bottles of water and those waters [were] distributed to each island and also into schools by the government of Tuvalu. And from there we can survive."

Rations of food were also provided to each island. "Bit by bit we used those and when we run out of the ration, the government still providing us with more until we were back again to our normal weather: sunny, warm and then sometimes rain."

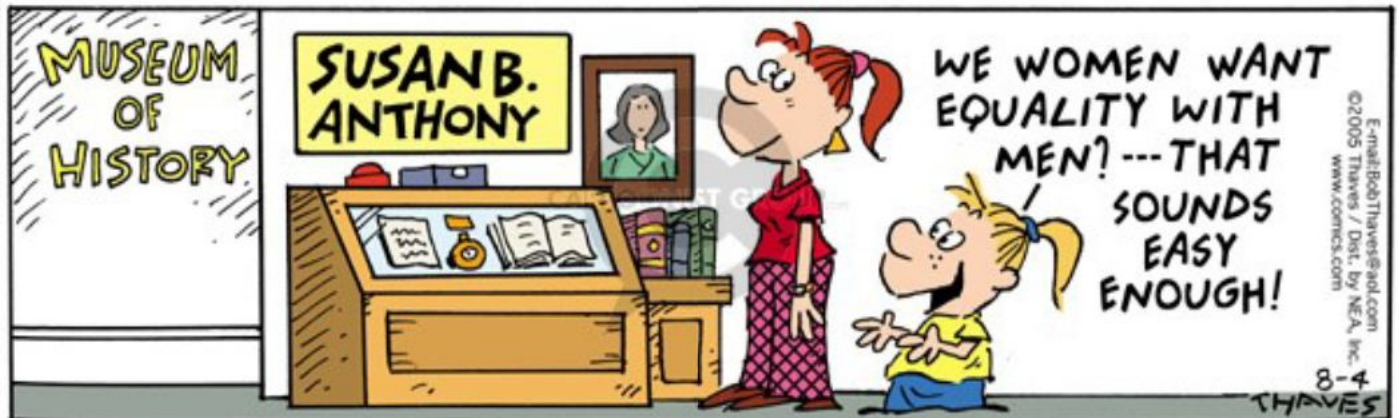

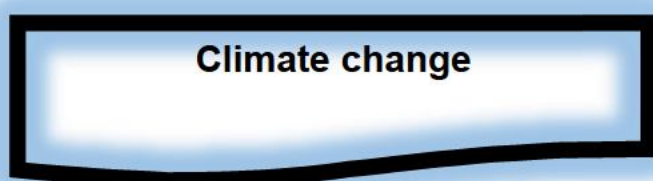

Teens and Cyberbullying

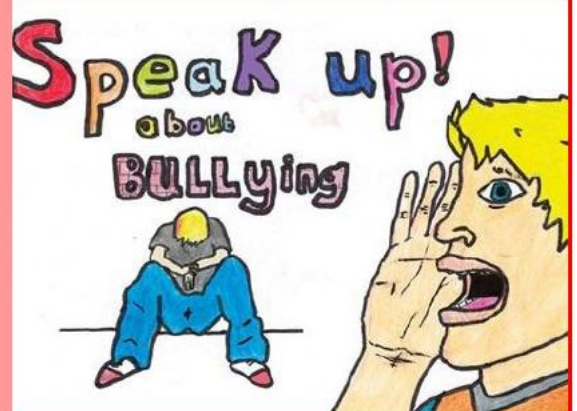
